 Know your terminology Terms you may hear on the radio or TV: Flood Watch = Flood possible Flood Warning = Flood is occuring Check if your home or work is in a floodplain, or an area that is on low-lying ground and may be subject to flooding. Check at http://quake.abag.ca.gov/floods/ Build an emergency kit See http://www.ready.gov for ideas Make a plan to call family, friends and neighbors, especially those who are elderly or have limited mobility Make sure you have enough gas in your car to evacuate Purchase flood insurance There are different types of insurance for owners and renters to protect their property. (See http://www.floodsmart.gov) 	 Listen to the radio/TV and NOAA radio Be prepared to evacuate When a flood or flash flood warning is issued, head for higher ground and take only essential items Turn off gas, electricity, and water Disconnect appliances Do not walk in moving water or drive in flood water 	 Listen to news reports Stay away from downed power lines Avoid roads where flood water was once present Return home only when authorities say it is safe Check in on family and friends Be cautious reentering buildings Clean, disinfect, and dry items touched by flood waters to prevent waterborne disease and mold

 Limit development areas at risk of flooding Use building materials that allow water to seep through the ground (for example, using sand and gravel) Preserve and restore wetlands Raise structures above flood level Account for climate change impacts in planning stormwater and sewer improvements 	 Ensure that all development projects are located in areas of low flood risk Prioritize high flood risk areas for natural flood control design approaches Assess potential impacts and engage affected residents in developing an adaptation plan Provide early warnings through multiple, culturally appropriate and accessible media outlets Ensure low- and mid-income households have access to transportation and other resources to evacuate 	 Join a local neighborhood group that is involved in disaster management and climate adaptation planning. See Local Resources. Let others in your neighborhood know about flood risks. Establish a system of community outreach to inform and check in on elderly and those most vulnerable.
